## NATIONAL CHARITY LEAGUE, INC. FORMS FIVE NEW CHAPTERS

## IN TEXAS

**COSTA MESA, CA (Oct. 8, 2019)** – <u>National Charity League, Inc.</u> (NCL), the nation's premier mother-daughter non-profit organization, announced the formation of five new chapters in the great state of Texas, bringing the total number of chapters in Texas to 93 and the total number in the United States to 270.

The newest Austin chapter, Austin360, is the 263<sup>rd</sup> NCL chapter in the United States. This chapter, combined with the existing 10 chapters in Austin, brings the total number of NCL Austin members to over 2,800. These members support more than 180 philanthropy partners and devoted 57,579 volunteer hours last year alone.

The Texas Diamonds Chapter has also formed in Cypress, Texas as the 39<sup>th</sup> chapter in the greater Houston area and 264<sup>th</sup> NCL chapter in the United States. The addition of this chapter brings the total number of NCL members to over 10,500 in the greater metropolitan Houston area. Members support more than 600 local philanthropies and devoted approximately 233,000 volunteer hours last year.

The Fredericksburg Chapter is NCL's 12<sup>th</sup> chapter in the greater Austin area and 265<sup>th</sup> NCL chapter in the United States. This chapter welcomes mothers and daughters who reside or attend school in Fredericksburg and surrounding areas.

The new Tyler Chapter is the organization's 268<sup>th</sup> NCL chapter in the United States. The Tyler Chapter will serve mothers and daughters who reside, work or attend school in Smith County, TX.

The 270<sup>th</sup> and most recent NCL chapter to form in the United States is the Stone Oak Chapter. This chapter joins four other flourishing chapters in the greater San Antonio area.

In addition to participating in national NCL philanthropic initiatives, the new chapters' inaugural members will have the opportunity to choose which local organizations they will support through hands-on volunteer service hours. Daughters in 7<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> grade, known as Ticktockers, and their mothers, known as Patronesses, will together

embark on a traditional core program focused on philanthropy, strengthening motherdaughter relationships, cultural experiences and leadership opportunities.

"Texas is one of National Charity League's fastest-growing states," said Renée Tuzee, CEO, National Charity League, Inc. "Like the existing chapters in Texas that paved the way for future growth, I am confident that these women are going to bring the heart and soul of National Charity League's initiatives to their communities and the entire state of Texas."
